Tension: Sanctification is the process of being made <u>holy</u> or set apart for God's purpose.

- This process involves both a one-time event of being <u>declared</u> holy (often referred to as <u>positional</u> sanctification salvation) and an ongoing process of spiritual growth and moral development (often referred to as <u>progressive</u> sanctification).
- Sanctification is an <u>inseparable</u> part of salvation. It is not a volitional process in that we don't choose to be; we must work to not be.
- **Definition:** <u>Instant</u> sanctification refers to the immediate and complete set-apartness we experience at the moment of salvation.
- **Imputed Righteousness:** This is the righteousness of Christ <u>credited</u> to us, not based on our own merits but on Christ's sacrifice.
- **Definition:** <u>Progressive</u> sanctification is the ongoing process of becoming more like Christ throughout our lives.
- **Daily Growth:** Sanctification is a <u>journey</u> of continual <u>growth</u> and transformation influenced by the Holy Spirit.
- **Practical Outworking:** It involves our <u>daily</u> choices, spiritual disciplines, and the continual surrender to God's will.
- There are three tools God uses for progressive Sanctification.
 - (a) Holy Spirit
 - (b) Trials or tests of our faith
 - (c) Personal <u>pursuit</u> of Righteousness
- Definition: <u>Final</u> sanctification refers to the ultimate completion of sanctification when we are fully and perfectly conformed to the <u>image</u> of Christ at glorification.
 Eternal Glory: It represents the fulfillment of God's premises and the

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
